

# Park Projects in 2023

Many exciting things are happening in Jasper County parks! Here are updates on three of our major projects.

### Nature Center Project:

Jasper County Conservation is working to construct a state-of-the-art Environmental Education Center on approximately 40 acres of land located just southeast of Newton, Iowa, adjacent to I-80 on the old county care facility park land. The price of Phase 1 of the project is \$2,204,509. Phase 1 is the nature center itself, while Phases 2 and 3 are a maintenance building with outdoor restrooms and a three seasons pavilion for outdoor events and programming. Jasper County Conservation staff and volunteers have already secured the funding for Phase 1 of this project! This includes a recent appropriation of \$400,000 in Jasper County ARPA funding and a \$550,000 Destination Iowa Grant. Ground breaking is expected to begin in 2024!

The Environmental Education Center is not simply a building, but will create an extraordinary location for agricultural research, education, and family enjoyment. The building is approximately 7,200 square feet and features flexible spaces including a display area, laboratory, classrooms, storage, kitchen, outdoor viewing platform, and offices. The facility will also serve as a community venue, capable of holding events for 400 people utilizing the main and lower levels and outdoor spaces. The building has been designed with green energy in mind, with the installation of a photovoltaic array that could generate enough energy to essentially operate "off the grid". Building mechanical, plumbing, and lighting systems will be extremely efficient and construction materials will be durable, low maintenance, and environmentally friendly. Local products will be utilized to the greatest extent possible.

The facility itself will serve as an educational tool by demonstrating environmentally sustainable construction and operational practices that will reduce our carbon footprint and teach about the impact of green energy on climate change. The 40-Acre Site Plan for the area includes the construction of two ponds, a handicapped accessible paved sculpture walk, community gardens, natural playscape, wetland exploration and education area, amphitheater for outdoor education programming, shelterhouse, soft trail system, group camp area for scouts and other youth groups, and a prairie restoration. Many of these site developments are already completed with other grant funds and donations (these funds are in addition to the \$1,320,000 in donations mentioned previously), including the two ponds, soft trail system, shelterhouse, and pollinator prairie restoration.

We are still fundraising for Phases 2 and 3, so donations are very much welcomed!!

### Mariposa Park's Bison Ridge Campground:

Bison Ridge Campground began construction during the spring of 2023. Fifteen campsites, with water and electric at each site, are being built, along with a shower house, dump station and

overflow parking. In addition, a cottage is being built this fall and winter with a second to hopefully follow in 2024-2025. The new campground and the first cottage are all slated to open in 2024! Funding sources for the project include a Land and Water Conservation (LAWCON) grant of \$129,000, matching dollars from Jasper County Conservation, and \$400,000 in Jasper County ARPA money.

### Chichaqua Valley Trail Repair:

The Chichaqua Valley Trail is undergoing some much needed repair work from approximately Indian Creek to W. 108<sup>th</sup> St N. This project includes 4603 SY full depth reclamation, excavation, subgrade prep, and then 4516 SY of 6" continuous reinforced PCC (concrete). This project

started August 1st and will be done in mid-September 2023 and is fully funded by Jasper County ARPA dollars totaling \$425,000.

## Uhlenhopp Cabin Rentals

The cabin located at the beautiful Uhlenhopp Arboretum in eastern Jasper County is available to rent all year long. In addition, the cabin will be decorated for Christmas all through the month of December!

The cabin has a full kitchen with limited pots/ pans, cooking utensils, table service, and coffee pot. Kitchen and hand towels are provided, but all bedding and bath towels will need to be brought by the renter. There is one queen-sized bed in the loft and one queen-sized hideaway bed on the lower level. Pets are not allowed.

The cabin may be rented for a minimum of two nights on weekdays, Sunday-Thursday (\$130/ night) and a minimum of two nights for weekends, Friday-Saturday (\$150/night). Full week reservations Friday-Friday are \$125/night. Three night stays are required for holiday weekends (\$150/night).

## 2023 Teacher Extern Experience

Jasper County Conservation was fortunate this summer to again have two teacher externs working with us on EE programming. Iowa STEM Teacher Externships, a program of the Iowa Governor's STEM Advisory Council, is supported through state-appropriated funds and the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Resource Enhancement and Protection Conservation Education Program (REAP-CEP) Grant for Teacher Externships with Environmental and Conservation Professionals, along with investments by Iowa business and industry partners.

During the summer, educators work side-byside with knowledgeable and skilled industry employees who help bring the classroom curriculum to life. Teacher Externships provide educators with the exposure to answer questions about realworld application, prepare students for careers they may have in the future, and improve educational experiences.

Our externs have been phenomenal and we really enjoy working with them! This year, our externs were Jarret Horn, Ag Teacher and FFA Advisor at Lynnville-Sully High School and Stacy DeCoster, Biology and General Science Teacher at Grinnell High School. They assisted naturalists with summer camps and public paddles, as well as working on various projects in the parks.

Here is a summary of the program by Jarret Horn: "A majority of my summer was spent assisting with the county's youth programming which was a blast. I particularly enjoyed watching students enjoy the outdoors and engage in critical thinking skills. My favorite camps this summer were the youth survival camp, watersports camp, and junior naturalist camp. In addition to helping with these programs, I also had the opportunity to work on a little bit of park maintenance and was

able to get a behind the scenes look into the work that goes into maintaining the prairies, woods, and waterways that make up the county parks. This was particularly useful in providing examples of real-life challenges that I plan to use in the units I teach on agriculture & natural resource management.

This school year I hope to put to work the experiences and connections that I have gained from my summer with JCCB to provide meaningful learning opportunities for my students. Some of these include designing an edible landscape/food forest project at Uhlenhopp Arboretum and attending a field day on bioreactors for farm field tile lines. I also look forward to also being able to utilize the learning resources that the new nature center will provide when it is built.

These experiences and the great folks I have had the privilege to work with have made it a great summer at Jasper County Conservation!"
