Full Moon, Blue Moon, Super Moon,

Lunar Eclipse!

Saturday, January 27, 7:00 PM Ashton Observatory

A very rare occurrence will happen on January 31st this year. We will be seeing a full moon, which is the second full moon the month (called a blue moon), it will be considered a super moon (very close to Earth), AND early in the morning we will have the opportunity to see a lunar eclipse (Earth moves in-between the sun and the moon). On their own, they are not as significant, but happening all in the same night is a pretty big deal!

Learn more about the moon at a free, informative program presented by the Des Moines Astronomical Society. If there is snow, we will have the snowshoes available for rent (\$5.00 per person) for an optional family snowshoe hike under the bright moon. Warm treats will be served! Conservation News

New Pond at Nature Center Area

A \$25,000 Fish Habitat Grant was received by JCCB to create a new 1-acre pond at the Nature Center area (across from the former county care facility area). Central College students assisted JCCB staff to install habitat structures in the pool area of the pond as a part of their Service Learning requirements.

This improvement, along with the remodeled shelter house, pollinator planting, and hiking trail, marks

the beginning of what is

planned for this special area. Funds are being secured from private donors, grants and businesses to complete the site developments and to construct the learning center. Mariposa Lake Restoration Project

About 70 people attended a Fish Fry at Mariposa Park on October 8th and learned about the upcoming water quality project at Mariposa Lake. JCCB staff and volunteers cooked and served fish (from Mariposa Lake), potatoes, baked beans and rolls while Luke Monat, the project engineer from Shive-Hattery, discussed Mariposa Lake Restoration project activities.

Earthwork will begin in December 2017 and is scheduled to end by September 15, 2018. Mobilization of equipment from Leffler Dirtworks from Oskaloosa will be one of the first things onlookers should expect to see, followed by the construction of earthen sediment holding structures in the bison pen area. The park will be closed during the project, but JCCB will create a safe viewing area for park visitors. Keep watch for progress at Mariposa and a new look in 2018!

Invasive Species Removal at Ashton

Non-native, invasive species are a problem in most all of Iowa's woodlands. Non-native species have been introduced to the state for a number different reasons, including ornamental value, wildlife habitat, and even as a living fence. Many non-native plants are very aggressive and outcompete our native woodland species for nutrients and sunlight. They can invade a forest and become the dominant plant in the understory in a very short period of time due to their rapid growth and abundance of seed.

Ashton Park is not immune to these invasive plants. Jasper County Conservation, with the assistance of the Iowa DNR, has recently implemented a comprehensive management plan to increase woodland vigor and reduce the competition of invasives within our native Oak-Hickory forest. Our initial steps have been to reintroduce fire to the woodland and to actively cut and treat with chemical the primary invasive plants in the park, including Autumn Olive, Bush Honeysuckle, and Mulberry. By reducing these invasive plants, young saplings, along with woodland wildflowers, will be able to compete for sunlight and nutrients and flourish.

Conservation staff and volunteers have been very active at Ashton this fall with the hopes that our efforts will have a direct effect on the overall health of the woodland. As you explore the park, you will see several areas of blackened understory and stumps from cut vegetation. You may also come across some larger stumps from native trees that have succumbed to disease. It is a continuous

process that we will be working on for several years to come. If individuals or groups are interested in helping with invasive species removal, give our office a call!
