# Volunteers Recognized at Annual Dinner

On November 27th, Jasper County Conservation volunteers were recognized and thanked for their efforts at a dinner in the Jasper County Community Center building. This is the third year a volunteer dinner has been organized.

A meal was prepared and served by Jasper County Conservation staff members for about 50 attendees. Conservation board members in attendance were Calvin Winn, Andy Stone and Carol Kramer. Conservation staff present were Keri Van Zante, Jade Read, Katie Cantu, Greg Oldsen, Ethan Vander Pol and Dennis Cooling. Special recognition was given to Janet Rinehart, who retired earlier this year after serving over 10 years as the conservation department's Office Manager.

Volunteers were thanked for helping to make the conservation department's events run smoothly and be successful, including large family programs such as the Off the Beaten Path Trail Race, Fall Festival, and Halloween Hike. Volunteers also helped on school field trips, at hunter education courses, with park maintenance, and other projects. According to Katie Cantu, Naturalist with Jasper County Conservation, staff members see almost 20,000 people annually at programs and manage over 3,000 acres of public park land. "Certainly, not enough good things can be said about everyone who gives so much to help our communities, county parks and wildlife, and they are appreciated immensely."

Special awards were given out to several outstanding volunteers. "Volunteer of the Year" went to Bob Christian for helping at many events including youth summer camps, hunter education

classes and family programs. Cindy Healy received the "Pioneer Award" for her 14 years of involvement with the annual Halloween Hike events. Stacey Wilson was given the "Environmental Educator of the Year" award for her assistance with school field trip groups, hunter education classes and other events.

Jasper County Conservation staff wanted to recognize a new volunteer who really jumped in with both feet this year, and so the "Fledgling Award" was given to Craig Armstrong, who promoted conservation events on the radio, attended event planning meetings and helped at the Off the Beaten Path Trail Race and Fall Festival. Lastly, a very special person was recognized as Jasper County's "Friend of Conservation." Gayle Uhlenhopp and Andrew Uhlenhopp accepted an award on behalf of the late Elliott Uhlenhopp, who has given his beautiful 250 acre arboretum, located in eastern Jasper County, to the conservation department to manage and open for public use. The Conservation Board is grateful for Elliott's passion and commitment to conservation and natural resources, and his willingness to leave this very special piece of land for all to enjoy.



We want to say a big thank you to the six students from the Newton High School Environmental Club who helped us plant 21 trees at Jacob Krumm Nature Preserve this past October. This project was made possible by a Trees for Kids grant through the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR). Pecans, river birch, and two varieties of maple trees were planted at the east side of the preserve to be used in future maple syrup programs, and three varieties of oak trees were added to Skinner Ridge to create an oaksavanna area (pictured below).
