Two New Park Signs Dedicated

Jasper County Conservation had dedications for two new park entrance signs this fall. The first was at Ashton Wildwood Park, memorializing a very special board member, Denis Wilcox, who sadly passed this year. Ashton was his favorite park, and after serving on the board for almost 30 years, he volunteered for the next 10 years mowing the area! The center green expanse at the park was also named Wilcox Green after him. We sure miss Denis, but it was a pleasure to spend the day with his children, grandchildren, his brother, and many of his special friends at the park.

Dennis Black, who served as the first Jasper County Conservation Director from 1970-2004, was honored with his name on the new entrance sign at Mariposa Recreation Area. Dennis and his family moved into the house at Mariposa shortly after he was hired and he began a legacy of acquiring and developing land for Jasper County. In fact, the conservation board first met Dennis when they hired him to create a design for the Ashton Park campground. The rest is history!

Make sure you go check out these beautiful new additions to our parks. Winter is a great time to walk through Ashton and Mariposa. We'd like to thank Mingo Products and Krampe Welding and Fabrication for their awesome work, and all the special friends and family members who donated in remembrance of two conservation leaders. Raising Funds for a UTV

Jasper County Conservation recently opened a new park called Uhlenhopp Arboretum, located at 2706 E 146th St N, Grinnell, Iowa 50112. Elliott Uhlenhopp was a professor at Grinnell College and his wish was that his 250-acre arboretum be gifted to Jasper County Conservation upon his death. He reminded others, "The World needs more trees; plant as many as you can," and this is just what he did! JCC accepted his generous donation and has worked to create a natural area full of trails winding through prairie, timber, wetlands, and 7 ponds, each named for a day of the week. Over 4 miles of groomed trails showcase thousands of species of trees, native grasses and flowers, and encircle each of the ponds. One rental cabin (with more planned!) is also available at this beautiful area.

Jasper County Conservation is proud of this new park that opened during the fall of 2021. The amount of visitors to the area has been absolutely overwhelming. Bill Yeager, our special conservation volunteer and "Uhlenhopp trail mower" began to notice visitors coming out daily and sitting in wheel chairs at the shelter or sitting at picnic tables at the parking area and looking out into the preserve. He saw them smiling and pointing at far away sites and he wished he could get them out in to the park to show them the ponds, trails, the Great Blue Heron rookery, prairie plants and fruit trees strewn throughout the preserve.

It has brought him so much joy, and he wanted to be able the share the same joy with those who have mobility issues and could only sit at the parking area and imagine what was out over the hills and in the trees of the preserve. Bill has made it his goal to try to create a way for people with limited mobility to be able to experience the park as he has during his volunteer time. Bill has joined with Jasper County Conservation to raise



funds to purchase a UTV that will allow tours to be held at Uhlenhopp (and other conservation areas!) for individuals who aren't able to hike to view the beauty of our county parks.
