

Red Rock Prairie Trail Opening

The grand opening of the Red Rock Prairie Trail was held on September 8, 2022. A ribbon cutting took place at 5:00pm at Entryway Park by the bison sculpture in Prairie City. The public was encouraged to ride the trail, enjoy specials at local businesses, and then celebrate again at 6:00pm in Monroe with free hot dogs and ice cream at Red Rock Park. Free bike helmets were given to the first 50 kids under 12 in attendance at each town celebration. Two new bicycles were also given away in each town!

The Red Rock Prairie Trail is a new 10 mile concrete recreational trail from Monroe, to Prairie City, and to the entrance of Neal Smith National Wildlife Refuge. Future phases of this project include the connection of the trail to Mitchellville and then to the Des Moines metro!

ARPA Funding


On Tuesday evening, September 6, 2022, the county ARPA (American Recovery Plan Act) committee voted on how to spend Jasper County's \$7.2 million. Through an 8-1 vote, it was approved to give \$1.25 million to conservation!

The funding recommendation was: \$450,000 to fix the Chichaqua Valley Trail,

\$400,000 to add to the development of the Mariposa Campground, and

\$400,000 for the nature center.

This recommendation went in front of the Board of Supervisors for a vote, and was AP-PROVED!! We are so every excited about this unbelievable boost for conservation in Jasper County!

Wellmark MATCH Grant

The Wellmark Foundation notified 22 Iowa organizations they will receive Matching Assets to Community Health (MATCH) grant funds. Each of these grantees are planning projects that can help individuals, families and communities achieve better health through built environment initiatives that encourage physical activity or providing access to healthy foods.

"Each project included here has the potential to make a positive, long-term impact on the overall health and well-being of their community which will enhance the quality of life for generations to come," said Mary Lawyer, executive director for The Wellmark Foundation. "We're excited to see the planning, focus and community engagement within each of the selected applications."

Jasper County Conservation received \$100,000 for the second phase of the Red Rock Prairie Trail (*Prairie City to Mitchellville*). The Red Rock Prairie Trail corridor exists on an old rail bed and will eventually link with the Volksweg Trail from Pella/Red Rock to Neal Smith National Wildlife Refuge to Mitchellville and eventually to Des Moines and Saylorville Lake. This phase of the project will develop seven additional miles of bike and pedestrian improvements to complete the 16.35 mile Red Rock Prairie Trail.
