Tobacco-Free/Nicotine-Free Policy guidelines for use with Preschools and Child Care Centers/Homes

Policy

Effective Date:

[Preschool/ child care] facilities and grounds, including [preschool/child care] vehicles, are off limits for tobacco and nicotine use including but not limited to cigarettes, cigars, chewing tobacco, snuff, pipes, snus, Electronic Smoking Devices (ESD) and nicotine products that are not Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved for tobacco cessation. This requirement extends to students, employees and visitors. This policy applies at all times, including [preschool/child care]-sponsored and non-[preschool/child care] sponsored events. Persons failing to abide by this policy are required to extinguish their smoking material, dispose of the tobacco/nicotine product or leave the [preschool/child care] premises immediately. It is the responsibility of the administration/upper management to enforce this policy.

Tobacco-Free/Nicotine-Free Policy

Policy

The use of all tobacco and nicotine products is strictly prohibited. Prohibited tobacco and nicotine products include but are not limited to: tobacco or tobacco-like products, and all nicotine products not regulated or approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for tobacco cessation (examples include but are not limited to cigarettes, electronic smoking devices (ESD), cigars, chewing tobacco, snuff, pipes, snus, emerging tobacco products, vape, etc.). This policy applies at all times.

Areas covered by this policy include: (keep all that apply, delete those that don't)

- o any and all buildings, owned, leased, rented and areas maintained by [business]
- vehicles owned or leased by [business]
- o any grounds, parking lots, ramps, plazas or contiguous sidewalks
- o vehicles of any employee, contractor, vendor or visitor when on [business] property
- The distribution or sale of all tobacco products

There are no designated smoking areas within any location or on any grounds. Ash receptacles and spittoons are not available on company property.

All employees, while representing the company, shall not use tobacco products. Adherence to this policy requires that tobacco users refrain from using these products while on campuses and when at work/on company business.

All persons (employees, visitors, vendors, contract workers, volunteers, etc) are expected to comply with this policy.

The policy complies with the Iowa Smokefree Air Act in the Iowa Code. smokefreeair.iowa.gov

Responsibility

All employees share in the responsibility for enforcing the policy.

Procedures

- All persons are asked to extinguish and/or cease from using all tobacco, nicotine, or tobacco-like products before coming onto property.
- Visitors or other non-employees will be politely informed of any policy violation and asked to cease use or leave the property.
- Applicants and interviewees will be advised that [business] is a tobacco-free worksite. As a part of
 the application process each applicant will acknowledge in writing that they understand
 [business]'s policy and attest that they do not use tobacco as a requirement for further
 consideration.
- Employees who violate the policy will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination.

What is a Hazard Vulnerability Assessment?

A Hazard Vulnerability Assessment (HVA) is a systematic approach to identifying hazards of risks that are most likely to have an impact on your healthcare facility and the surrounding community. This can include the demand for the facility to provide services or its ability to provide those services. HVA tools will put each hazard in perspective using categories such as probability, human impact, property and business impact and mitigation strategies. HVA's are evolving documents. Healthcare facilities conduct and/or annually review their HVA. The process should involve community partners, at a minimum the County Emergency Management Agency (EMA).

Purpose of the HVA:

Drive the focus of your Emergency Preparedness Program, plan development and updating and training for your organization

Goals of the Healthcare Coalition (HCC) HVA:

- o assess and rank potential HCC threats or hazards,
- o identify any potential HCC or system wide vulnerabilities or gaps,
- o promote implementation of hazard mitigation strategies and plans,
- o develop/update the HCC 5-year training and exercise plan,
- o promote information sharing across the HCC about best practices related to threat preparedness.

How to conduct the HVA:

- 1. Assemble a multidisciplinary team no silos minimum of EMA.
- 2. Choose a tool and list out different hazards.
- 3. As a team, discuss the impacts and current mitigation of each hazard.
- 4. Document in the chosen tool.
- 5. Review and rank hazards using the data from the tool.
- 6. Discuss how your agency plans to address the identified hazards.
